

Join the friends of the Kirkwood Historical Society on Monday, October 1, 2018 from 10:00 am – 11:30 am at Mudd's Grove for **“The Evolution of American Mourning Customs”** presented by Paula Zalar. The presentation begins with details about Civil War mourning practices and how they differ from earlier customs, then continue emphasizing customs from the Civil war through Victorian times. What did early Christians consider to be a “good death?” Why was the deceased' hair used in jewelry and other items/ What is the symbolism in markers, placement of flowers and ivy at graves? 
The Families of Mudd's Grove: The Peter Behr Family

Sarah Lord was born in Zanesville, Ohio in 1840 and married a REussian immigrant tallow merchant, Peter Behr, in 1857, when she was only 17. Peter and Sarah Behr moved to St. Louis where Peter established a candle and tallow business and they started to raise their family. By the time Peter and Sarah Behr were married ten years their family numbered five children. In addition, Sarah's younger sister, Virginia Lord, came to live with the Behr family in St. Louis in 1870. In 1871, while living with her sister's family, Virginia met and married George Dana and after the wedding the newly weds moved into a place of their own.

Peter Behr's St. Louis candle and tallow business was very successful and the couple had two more children in the late 1870's for a total of seven. In 1880, though, the Behr's youngest son, Teddy died. That same year on November 11, Sarah Behr gave birth to a new baby girl, whom she named Gladys, so although she had given birth to eight children, by the end of 1880 the family was back to seven children again. Having such a large family with children between the ages of 1 and 20, was probably instrumental in the Behr;s decision to move their family out of the city and into Kirkwood in 1880. Apparently the new community was a good fit for the family because, after living in Kirkwood for two years, they decided to make it their permanent home. In 1882, they purchased the house at Harrison and Main from the Mudds for \$7,000.

For seven years Sarah and Peter Behr lived in the house at Jarrison and Main. By that time, only two of their children, Gladys and Benjamin, ages 9 and 16, remained at home with them as all the others had “gone out on their own.” With Sarah ailing and no longer needing such a big house, Sarah and Peter behr decided to sell the house to Sarah's younger sister and brother-in-law, Virginia and George Dana in 1889. The price they asked was only \$1,000 more than what they had paid in 1880...\$8,000.
